Funny, i used storebought box dye for years, then switched to the separate-component mix-it-yourself stuff from beauty supply stores. I've actually had \*far\* better results mixing the dye myself than with box dyes, & i like being able to mix the amount i need. I only need 2 oz to do my roots, but it would always make me feel wasteful when the store ones made up 4 oz. & even when i split them out & mixed them up in smaller quantities in my own applicator, i felt bad because i had all that trash to throw away (extra applicator, instructions, box). Now i have my own fab reusable rubber gloves (instead of those hand shaped snadwich bags you get in box dyes), i generate less waste, & i like the results better. So obviously some folks' MMV on this. :)

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
